A MESSAGE FROM THE **FOUNDATION**

At Community Foundation Grey Bruce, over the past year, we have been using the hashtag #compassioninaction in our messaging—a phrase that captures our commitment to the wellbeing of our community. We grant strategically based on local knowledge for local impact. Through our acquaintance with the projects that are proposed by local charities and non-profits in response to our call for applications, we know that families in Grey Bruce are continuing to feel the stress of rising inflation. We know the impact of the affordable housing crisis and how it can force choices between paying the mortgage or rent or buying groceries. Coming out of the prolonged pandemic, we are witness to the impacts on people's mental wellness, the rise in addictions and the erosion of safety in our towns and cities. With knowledge and compassion, community philanthropy is mobilizing to address the needs we perceive.

Acknowledging these pressures, Community Foundations across Canada are also experiencing changes in the philanthropic sector with new legislation that governs our work. There are sector-wide shifts due to a new granting regime in Canada, set out by the federal government in 2022. The disbursement quota, that prescribes the assets that we must divest annually, shifted from 3.5 to 5 percent. We are being asked to examine options for funding non-qualified donees in the years ahead. Changes to tax laws may also impose alternative minimum taxes. Change is the only constant.

While the global stock markets have been volatile over the past two years, the Foundation, with an eye to the long game, continued to grant to numerous non-profits. Over the past year, we ran two intakes for Community granting, and a capital grant program. We have also rolled out substantial funds through donor-designated and agency grants as well as education grants that assist Grey Bruce students in their post-secondary pursuits.

In addition to community granting, your Community Foundation is undertaking Social Impact Investing, directing one percent of our total assets for local investment in social enterprises. We continue to learn about this exciting new way to increase our impact and are coaching local organizations to close the circle on their impact measurement, towards successful application to our fund. Over the past year, we have been developing partnerships with financial entities that will help us administer loans and reaching out to our peer group for mentorship in the process. We are so grateful for our network of more than 201 community foundations from coast to coast to coast! (Cont. on Pg. 2)

A Message from The Foundation (Cont.)

In terms of outreach and relationship building, the Foundation's On the Road tour in 2022 and 2023 got staff out in the field talking to grant recipients, collecting stories, and raising our profile in communities across the region. Such information-gathering helps us tremendously with planning our grantmaking, being as responsive as we can to emergent needs and trends. We hope you follow the Foundation on social media, and sign up for our newsletters, to keep up with the stories we share.

We have seen changes in the faces around the table at Community Foundation Grey Bruce over the past year. Team building is important and in the past year we have undertaken learning initiatives like training on Equity, Diversity and Inclusion and outreach like our workday volunteering on the Habitat for Humanity work site at Saugeen First Nation. We thank our staff and board for their dedication and commitment to community building.

We are also grateful to you, for your ongoing support of community philanthropy. Community Foundation Grey Bruce looks forward to continuing to serve and assist in the years ahead.

HELPING KEEP YOUTH IN TRANSITION HOUSED

"Helping Youth in Transition" addresses the needs of youth, 16 to 24 years of age, facing homelessness in Grey Bruce, through a rent supplement along with counselling and mentoring to ensure best outcomes. Project partners include CFGB, United Way of Bruce Grey, Grey Bruce Poverty Task Force, YMCA of Owen Sound Bruce Grey, private donors, and other foundations. With originating support from the Laidlaw family and the Laidlaw Foundation, the Joseph & Marilyn Hunt Fund, and the Next25 Fund, the project has been able to offer a monthly rent supplement over he past year to the first cohort of 12 youth from the By-Names list. The By-Name Lists allow communities to know every person experiencing homelessness by name and facilitate efficient decisions around how best to refer housing resources. YMCA Housing Services delivers the supplement as well as wrap around services, mentoring, and transitional supports that have the potential to significantly change the life trajectory of participants. The rent supplement adds to the supports available from the associated County, meaning that youth will have more money in their pockets, and sovereignty over their situation and finances. The project aims to lend dignity and autonomy to youth in transition. Our model will track the impact of this supplement and will reflect the changes in life trajectory of the 12+ individuals engaged in the effort. Donations to the project are greatly received. A NEW SCHOLARSHIP IN MEMORY OF SHARIF

Community Foundation Grey Bruce (CFGB) is pleased to announce that an anonymous donor has initiated a scholarship fund in memory of local business owner, Sharifur Rahman, who died from injuries sustained in a serious assault outside his restaurant in downtown Owen Sound on August 17, generate scholarship monies to support Grey Bruce students, enrolled in full-time course of study at a post-secondary educational institution, with a strong preference given to applicants who either themselves, or their parents, are newcomers to Canada, as immigrants or refugees. Applicants will be assessed based on academic record and financial need. Donations to the Sharifur Rahman Memorial Scholarship Fund to help grow its impact can be made through the CFGB website and will receive a charitable receipt.

GRANTS IN ACTION

Grey Bruce Food Share

The Grey Bruce Food Share is a partnership between Owen Sound Hunger and Relief Effort (OSHaRE) and The Salvation Army. This initiative aims to alleviate food insecurity and hunger through the sharing of surplus food items with 25 local food sharing agencies across Grey Bruce. Community Foundation Grey Bruce supported this initiative

through a \$3,000 grant from the Eva Leflar Donor Advised Endowed Fund.

GRANTS IN ACTION

Miyawaki Tiny Forest & Bioswale

Located at Peninsula Shores District School in Wiarton, this project serves as a demonstration site to educate students and the community about nature-based solutions for stormwater management. The bioswale and Tiny Forest planting were implemented by Regenerate Grey Bruce and The Sustainability Project with funding from Lake Huron Forever through Bruce Power. Students, volunteers, and community partners have learned through hands-on engagement with the site that will flourish for years to come.


